# THE FUTURE IS NOW



#### HISTORY

In 1971, private developers were proposing to build a large trailer park on several islands in Lemon Bay (northeast of Stump Pass) and to construct a bridge from Manasota Key to the islands. Manasota Key and Englewood community leaders, concerned about the environmental impacts, banded together to find a way to limit the development. Lemon Bay Conservancy was formed to support that effort and to protect local environmental resources in the years ahead.

In the decades since, the Conservancy has played important roles in the creation of Blind Pass Park, Lemon Bay Park, Indian Mound Park and Cedar Point Park. We worked with state and county officials to have Lemon Bay designated an "Outstanding Florida Water" and have advocated for a wide variety of environmental protection initiatives to ensure the future of or our sensitive coastal ecosystems.

Our land holdings have grown to include: two small islands and several parcels of mangrove shoreline along Lemon Bay, Scrub Jay habitat within the Peace River watershed and two acres of waterfront property in the center of Cedar Point Park. In 2010, we acquired the former Wildflower Golf Course and have begun transforming it into Wildflower Preserve, a remarkable 80 acre natural area with hiking trails and wetlands. In 2011, we acquired ten acres of environmentally sensitive land on Thornton Key, a bridgeless barrier island.

#### **OUR COMMITMENT**

#### SAVING LAND

Over the years, the Lemon Bay Conservancy has been involved in saving hundreds of acres of land from development. We work with individuals, businesses, government agencies, and other environmental groups to create conservation corridors for the protection of our water supply, to deter storm surge, to provide critical habitat for wildlife, and to sustain the quality of life enjoyed by

Often, the land we help to protect is placed into public ownership. In other cases, private land owners choose to forever preserve the natural resources on their properties through conservation easements. And, in some situations, Lemon Bay Conservancy becomes the land owner.

#### **EDUCATING**

Lemon Bay Conservancy periodically hosts programs and lectures designed to enhance public understanding of environmental topics. We sponsor educational nature walks and tours. And, we publish informative brochures and newsletters on a variety of subjects. One of our latest initiatives is partnering with the Charlotte County school system to develop innovative STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) educational programs for middle and high school students that will use Wildflower Preserve as an outdoor learning laboratory.

#### ADVOCATING

The Lemon Bay Conservancy environmental advocacy committee regularly reviews environmental issues that may impact the Lemon Bay and Charlotte Harbor areas and advocates for appropriate decisions. Alone and hand-inhand with other organizations we seek to serve as a voice for the people. We and our members stand ever ready to challenge any activity, public or private, that threatens our marvelous ecosystems.
